Introduction

In 2015, the Global Sepsis Alliance launched the Global Sepsis Awards, honoring major contributions in the fight against sepsis worldwide on a yearly basis. The GSA Awards are exclusively sponsored by the Erin Kay Flatley Memorial Foundation.

Categories

The GSA Awards are granted in three categories:

1. Governments and Healthcare Authorities

This award honors governments and healthcare authorities who have made important contributions to reduce the death toll from sepsis by originating or endorsing initiatives and programs that are aimed to increase awareness for sepsis, contribute to a better understanding of the epidemiology and burden of sepsis, or foster the establishment of quality improvement programs for the prevention, early recognition, and appropriate treatment of sepsis on the national or global level.

2. Non-Governmental Organizations, Patient Advocate Groups, or Healthcare Provider Groups

This award honors organizations that have contributed to a better understanding or the reduction of the burden of sepsis by increasing sepsis awareness and/or initiating quality improvement programs for sepsis prevention and management on the local, regional, national, or international level. Two winners will be awarded in this category: One from a low-income* country and one from a highincome country*. An award in this category is remunerated with \$2,500 each.

3. Individual Nominees

Individual Nominees must be able to demonstrate how their body of work has contributed to sustainable changes in one or more of the following to practices or programs: **a**) sepsis prevention, **b**) early recognition, **c**) treatment, or **d**) rehabilitation from long-term consequences of sepsis.

Two winners will be awarded in this category: One from a lowincome* country and one from a high-income country*. An award in this category is remunerated with \$2,500 each.

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Deadline

The deadline for applications and nominations is March 31st every year.

How to Apply

Please apply or nominate <u>through our website</u>. Please understand that applications via email cannot be considered.

Requirements for *All* **Submissions**

In the nomination/application process for all three categories, you will be asked to provide the following:

- Summary of the sepsis related activities and achievements, including their specific impact on sepsis awareness, advocacy, patient outcome, and quality of life of sepsis survivors, in between 300 and 1000 words
- Supporting documentation, such as pictures, supporting statements, endorsements, papers, press snippets, or similar
- A CV of the key individual responsible for the project
- Your own contact information
- In case of a nomination, the contact details for the representative of the organization or the person you are nominating

Additional Considerations for Submissions in Cat. 1

Eligible are representatives of national governments and other bodies that are responsible for national and global health. *The candidates for this award should be nominated by national and international organizations that experienced consistent support either directly by the candidate himself or the institution that he or she is representing.* The nominees and their respective institution, e.g., ministries of health, should promote the activities of the organizations, healthcare providers, and individuals in their respective countries that are dedicated to increase sepsis awareness and quality improvement of sepsis management.

Such governmental support may include:

- Prioritization of sepsis as a major health problem on the national healthcare agenda
- Support of legislation to facilitate prevention, detection, and treatment of sepsis
- Documentation of the burden of sepsis in the national and global burden of disease reports
- Support of the international efforts by the GSA and the World Sepsis Day Movement in implementing the demands of the WHO Resolution on Sepsis



- Support of the appropriate documentation and coding of sepsis in the International Classification of Diseases system ICD 9/10
- Adequate recognition of sepsis in the curricula of medical schools
- Support of the implementation of protocols and procedures to ensure the quality of sepsis management
- Promotion and dissemination of best practices
- Promoting patient advocacy
- Support in the establishment of rehabilitation services for sepsis survivors

Additional Considerations for Submissions in Cat. 2

Applications by eligible organizations, healthcare provider or advocacy groups should demonstrate a specific and significant contribution to the improvement of sepsis awareness, sepsis prevention, or quality of sepsis management. Ideally, the focus of the project or initiative should extend beyond local areas to achieve regional (e.g. statewide) or national impact.

These projects or initiatives may include:

- Effective approaches to increase awareness of sepsis and involvement of policy makers and healthcare authorities in the fight against sepsis
- Helping sepsis victims and their relatives to better understand and cope with sepsis and its long-term consequences
- Implementation of protocols and procedures
- Promotion and dissemination of best practices
- Transformation of organizational culture
- Outreach for treatment or for change in legislation
- Promoting patient advocacy and education

Evaluation and Composition of the Jury

All submissions will be evaluated thoroughly by the GSA Award Jury, which is a panel of internationally recognized experts in patient safety and sepsis management. All decisions are final. Jury members may be nominated annually by the GSA Executive Board. If a jury member encounters a conflict of interest, for example if an organization which he or she has ties to has applied or been nominated for a GSA Award, that person must immediately make the conflict of interest known and step down as a member of the jury for the respective year.

Notification and Award Ceremony

A nominee or applicant chosen as a winner of a GSA Award by the GSA Award Jury will be notified by email. In collaboration with the WSD Head Office, a suitable venue for the award ceremony will be determined, for example an upcoming meeting or congress of a GSA member organization. The GSA Award will be presented in person by a member of the GSA Award Jury or an employee of the Global Sepsis Alliance. The venue and presenter to be at the discretion of and decided by a majority vote of the GSA Award Jury.

About the Global Sepsis Alliance

The Global Sepsis Awards are hosted by the <u>Global Sepsis Alliance</u>, a nonprofit charity organization with the mission to provide global leadership to reduce the worldwide burden of sepsis. The GSA is the initiator of <u>World</u> <u>Sepsis Day</u> on September 13 and <u>World Sepsis Congress</u>, a series of free online congresses bringing knowledge about sepsis to all parts of the world, among other initiatives.

The GSA works closely with its over 90 member organizations, patient advocacy groups, professional societies, healthcare authorities, and governments to implement changes on how sepsis is prioritized, diagnosed, and treated all around the world, as laid out by the <u>WHO Resolution on</u> <u>Sepsis</u>.
